Member Spotlight: Maple Valley Farms

Maple Valley Farms is a family-run business in Jay, Maine, making maple products with the second and third generation of the Couture family now operating the business.

Placide Couture began collecting sap in 1964, a year after he bought the farm, and produced syrup every year until 1998. In 2002, his son Tony had a renewed interest in maple products and so

began the construction of a new facility. By 2003, the new facility was open and syrup was again being produced at Maple Valley Farms. This new operation features modern equipment that had not previously been in place.

With 2,300 taps and seven miles of lines, the system is geared to make 600 gallons of syrup per year. The automatic system now includes vacuum pumps, and the sap is collected at various collecting points before being pumped up 800 feet underground to the storage tank in the building.

The sap is boiled in an oilfired evaporator and can produce about five gallons of syrup per hour. Now in its 14th consecutive year under Tony and Irene Couture, their daughter Lindsay has also taken an interest and works with her parents to produce the syrup every year, along with other products such as candy, taffy and sugar.

Stop by the farm on March 27 for Maine Maple Sunday and enjoy samples of maple syrup and other maple delights as well as demonstrations on making the syrup. For more information call (207) 645-2328 or visit them at 1304 Franklin Road, Jay.

our residents. The Ecumenical Heating Assistance and Warming Centers are available to help keep folks warm. The United Way is a huge asset for our community for connecting many residents with available resources. You can simply call 2-1-1 to get information on what's available. There has been an incredible amount of work that the Western Maine Community Action (WMCA) has done in our area. As well as groups like the Franklin Resource Collaborative at Franklin Memorial Hospital and the Safe Schools Committee from our local school district.

Just this past year, the Franklin County Chamber of Commerce collected over 200 food baskets as part of the Gerry Wiles Food Basket drive for families in need. The Farmington Rotary club helped collect over 300 pairs of new pajamas for the Children's Task Force to help keep our children warm.

Another important group

that needs to be considered in our community are our senior citizens. Seniors Plus does a great job in assisting our older population through its Meals on Wheels program. This program provides hot, nutritious meals to homebound older adults and adults with disabilities, Daily safety checks and a friendly hello from a volunteer are also part of the program. For information and assistance, you can call 1-800-427-1241 and they can help connect you to the right recourses. They also provide caregiver support and Medicare counseling. The Franklin County Sherriff's Office also offers a program called Elder Check for those seniors living in the outskirts of Franklin County.

It's predicted that by 2025 over one-quarter of Franklin County's population will be over the age of 65. Last September a group of local organizers lead by Dr. Michele McCormick from FMH and Dr. Thomas Ward, superintendent of schools

in RSU9, organized a com-

munity forum to help bring together local resource providers in the area. As an outcome of this Community Forum, a follow-up healthcare event is being planned. This forum is an invitation to the Greater Franklin County Community to help shape the future of healthcare in the community. In conjunction with this event, a presentation by poverty expert Dr. Donna Beegle is being planned. Here is a description of the event by Ray Therrien, Director of Adult Education who is helping to organize the event:

"Dr. Donna Beegle will be joining us in greater Franklin County on March 17 and 18. Dr. Beegle is the founder of Communication Across Barriers and the author of See Poverty...Be the Difference and An Action Approach to Educating Students in Poverty. She has studied and worked extensively with educators, social service professionals, justice professionals, faith and community-based organizations and health professionals across the country. Dr. Beegle has received national acclaim for her ability to passionately and succinctly address the issues of poverty. Local schools, businesses and nonprofits are working together to implement a community wide approach that bridges the gap between social service operations and the people who need them by creating a system where our communities are working together to offer support to people living in poverty, helping them to realize their strengths and potential for moving forward."

From helping our homeless and our seniors and all those who struggle with poverty, Franklin County has a giving population that comes together in a time of need. Just one more reason we love living, working and recreating in Franklin County.
