

Letter from the President of the Franklin County Chamber of Commerce

But there is always more we can do.

As names like Ted, Bernie, Marco, Hillary and Donald have become household names — like the dysfunctional family members we all know and love. We want to make sure that everyone knows that there is no D, R or I in Chamber of Commerce. Your local Chamber does not support any par-

ticular political party. We do support any candidate that is looking out for the best interests of our citizens. We know many times politics is a part of getting what we want and need to make Franklin County a great place to live, work and recreate. Sometimes, it's just a matter of balancing the special interests of those three things.

This is where the Chamber needs to become more involved in the issues that affect Franklin County. We benefit from the support of our local legislators in Augusta. Representatives Russell Black, Paul Gilbert and Tom Skolfield have all worked with the Chamber and it's members to bring about needed changes in legislation (though they may not all agree on how).

State Senator Tom Saviello is a strong advocate for the Chamber and what it stands for. He takes the time to support our businesses and our students. Foster CTE Center recently had some students from our forestry program visit Augusta to comment on a bill that would provide funding to our state high school forestry programs. He not only made them feel wel-

comed, but took the time to show them around the capital building. This is something these students will always remember.

We also have close contact with Carlene Tremblay of Senator Collin's office, Samantha Warren of Congressman Poliquin's office and Ben Tucker of Senator King's office. These connections help keep the line of communications open for both the people of Franklin County and those that represent them.

The big issue that is coming up now is the increase to the minimum wage. Is it long overdue or is over done? Will it bring greater prosperity to the area or cause small business to struggle? We are starting to survey our members to determine their opinions on this issue. If we

have a definitive opinion from our members, then it's the responsibility of the Chamber to support or not support the initiative. More to come on that soon.

Last week I had the pleasure of traveling to Washington D.C. to advocate for Federal funding for Career and Technical Education. While I was there, I was able to meet with staffers from Congresswoman Pingree's office,

Congressman Poliquin's office, Senator King and Senator Collin's office. Myself and two other representatives from Maine were able to discuss with them the issues we had and why we think they should support certain legislation.

Not only did we speak with the staffers, but we were able to meet with the representatives and senators themselves. Congressman Poliquin spent over 15 minutes talking with us about the needs for Maine workers. Senator Collins was genuinely interested in what we had to say. She asked questions and took notes. Senator King actually stepped out of an Armed Services Committee hearing to speak with us directly. During all our visits we never felt rushed or that

The 2016 Franklin County Chamber of Commerce David Robie Memorial Scholarship applications are now available. The Scholarship is in memory of the late David Robie and is to encourage continuing or higher education for Franklin County residents through financial assistance.

The Scholarships are open to any resident of Franklin County who has lived in the county for at least the prior 12 months. This scholarship will be awarded to a resident planning to, or currently attending an accredited, post-secondary school. The Franklin County Chamber of Commerce's Business After Hours networking event in March was held at Tumbledown Brewing.

Owners, Matt and Meaghan Swan, gave tours of the facilities and provided samples of Tumbledown Beers. Matt explained to attendees how Tumbledown Brewing processes four basic ingredients (water, grain, hops and yeast) into beer. Tumbledown Brewing is filled with vats and fermenters that process batches of about 120 gallons. As a small brewery, much of the work is done by hand.

Beer is sold in growlers, a half gallon bottle of beer, and a new 22 ounce bottle is now sold in stores. Visit Tumbledown Brewing located in the Eastside Mall, 805 Farmington Falls Road in Farmington to try a sample and buy your favorite Tumbledown Beer.
