# Member Spotlight: **Rustic Roots Farm**

Erica Emery started Rustic tion conservation practices Roots Farm in 2013 and is now going into her fourth growing season this year. Though she's a first generation owner of the farm, her father's side of the family was involved in dairy farming, so she's always been close to the farm. Located at 120 Vipah Lane in Farmington, the farm is about two acres with an additional acre rented near the Chesterville/Farmington border where they grow sweet

Rustic Roots has always farmed without synthetic chemicals and uses crop rota-

to make sure that the land is preserved and healthy for future crops. By using local sources for fertilizers such as a local fish-based organic fertilizer made at Living Acres in New Sharon as well as local organic compost, seeds and practices, she makes sure that her practices are as sustainable and community-supported as possible. Being a small farm, they use mainly hand tools, but are also making an effort to stay updated with new implements or practices being used in the field.

With 35 different kinds of produce and 80-plus varieties represented, Rustic Roots Farm has a wide variety of vegetables for people to purchase through either Community Supported Agriculture Farm Shares (CSA) or through the weekly farmer's market at the Court House parking lot every Saturday from 9 a.m. to noon in Farmington. CSA farm shares are still available to purchase at their website www.rustricrootsfarm.com where you can sign up to get a box of vegetables every week for 20 weeks. There is always a variety of different produce



depending on the season. New this year is Farmer's Market Share which works more like a gift card where you use at the farm stand more suited for people who aren't going to be around all summer for the weekly boxes or those who want to receive a smaller amount of produce.

Almost all firms with employees are small. They make up 96.9 percent of all employers in the state. (Source: SUSB)

Firms with fewer than 100 employees have the largest share of small business employment.

In Maine, small businesses created 5,076 net new jobs in 2012. The biggest gain was in

the smallest firm size category of one to four employees. (Source:

The number of people who were primarily selfemployed in 2013 decreased by 4.1 percent relative to the previous year.

The state's private-sector employment growth increased over the 12-month period ending in October 2014 by 1.3 percent. This was below the national average growth rate for this period of 2.3 percent. (Source: BLS)

This emphasizes the important role that small businesses have in the Maine economy. At the Entrepreneurs Connect event, attendees heard a keynote presentation from Pete Roberts of Origin USA as well as presentations by Andy Marble of Marble Family Farms, Matt Swan of Tumbledown Brewing and Meghan Allen of Richards' Florist, All local Farmington area residents, three of the four went to school at Mt Blue and all of them shared a similar drive

to succeed. They shared the trials and tribulations of starting and owning your own business. I was inspired listening to how they persevered as they followed their dreams of being their own

Although they all possessed some unique qualities that allowed them to be successful, they all shared that it doesn't come without a lot of work and a lot of drive. I imagine their stories are similar to the others that make up the large percentage of small business in Maine.

As the Chamber continues to support our small business sector, please watch for more Entrepreneurs Connect events to help those with the dreams of business ownership with those that have succeeded.
